From the President's Desk...



Well, I was wrong! In the last issue I said it was my last as your editor. It should have been if I had not procrastinated in getting everything out to our new Outreach Committee. As I was preparing that work, I realized that the February issue is always the issue devoted to the conference material. Since I already had about 9 pages already completed, I let my fingers do the walking and finished this issue.

But rest assured, it will be my last. I am giving over that role and many others as we broaden our leadership within APHNYS. Just like our cooperation with MANY, the Pomeroy Foundation, the Conference on New York State History and others, this is how it should work.

APHNYS is now financially strong enough to move ahead with improving our methods, and with ensuring that we have the means to reach out to our membership with a more regular basis. That is the comment that I hear the most — that they want to hear from us, they (meaning you) want to know that we are there to help with specific issues.

While it is important that APHNYS plays a statewide role in our history community (which we are doing with efforts in cooperation, conference planning, and strengthening our history and heritage interests), it is more important that we find better ways to bring those interests to each individual historian.

And by historian, I do mean an individual. That is one effort we will continue to stress. We know that we as individuals have the capability of being a strong network that can influence the state's history efforts. But too often, we get left behind by the many other agencies and entities that also have a part of the history pie. Often because of better marketing efforts, and often because of politics.

Those are some of the reasons I want APHNYS involved in larger efforts. To some that sounds backward. We should be stronger on the more local level — but we cannot force them to understand the importance of the individual historian if we do not make efforts on the larger level. Imagine that we stress our uniqueness on a national level — which we are doing this year. Imagine that we present material and sessions to our appointing bodies at their conferences so that they too understand that we are and should be an important part of their governments.

We know that heritage tourism is big business, and we should be the ones playing integral roles in that venture. Cooperation brings our image to the forefront as do the work that we do every day — and in every municipality across the Empire State. No other state, no other history agency can really claim they have a member in every town, village, city, county and borough. But we can, and that can make all the difference.

It is time for us to grow, and, more importantly, it is time for me to turn this news-letter over.

From the State Historian



It's January once again and time to look back on the previous year and forward to the next.

My sense is that last year was a very good year for New York's historians and that APHNYS had a lot to do with making 2014 the success that it was. That's because this was year in which the members of the state's diverse history community recognized as never before that we all have more in common than we might once have thought. And along with our friends and colleagues who teach in our schools or in colleges and universities . . . or who manage museums and historic sites . . . or who work in historic preservation offices or archives and libraries, we're discovering that we all win when we learn from each other, support each other, and develop partnerships together. APHNYS people, I think, probably knew all of this long before this year, and this is likely why APHNYS has played such a strong leadership role in making good things happen.

One good thing that happened, of course, was that APHNYS members helped develop a new way of planning and managing the annual Conference on New York State History in June. The New York State Historical Association, which had long run the conference more or less on its own, invited APHNYS and other statewide historical organizations to help plan the conference program. And as the many APHNYS members who attended can attest, the result was a conference that served all of New York's historical interests, attracted an audience twice as large as previous conferences, and set a precedent for future programming. Dutchess County Historian William Tatum III did an outstanding job representing APHNYS on the program committee, and he participated knowledgably in a lively session on historical tourism. APHNYS president Gerry Smith—whose early support for this new way of planning the conference was a critical factor in making it happen—chaired an APHNYS-sponsored session that examined public television projects that raised public historical awareness and promoted economic development.

The year 2014 was noteworthy, too, for the revival of New York State History Month. November is History Month, of course, and APHNYS led the way in reminding New Yorkers of the exciting and important role that history plays in their daily lives. APHNYS members worked in collaboration with a wide range of organizations and individuals across the state and sponsored programs that set the stage for an even bigger History Month in 2015.

Congratulations, too, to the many APHNYS members who sponsored historical marker dedications and programs in 2014, often with the generous support of the William T. Pomeroy Foundation. It's amazing to me to see the dramatic increase in historical markers that has taken shape in just the past few years. None of this would have been possible without the enthusiastic leadership of Gerry Smith and the APHNYS board and the efforts of all of those APHNYS members who installed and dedicated so many new markers and repaired so many older ones. (Now if we could just get more people to recognize the difference between historic markers and historical markers....)

Very significantly, too, 2014 was a year in which APHNYS moved beyond the fiscal problems that had been such a problem in the past. This is a major achievement, and once again, the credit for making it happen goes to the organization's very capable leadership. With firmer financial footing, I am anticipating very good things for the coming years.

I know from the annual reports that you have been sending me (thank you) that individual APHNYS members accomplished quite a bit in 2014. I am constantly impressed by the diversity and quality of the work that all of you do, and I look forward to reading through your reports as they come in.

I look forward to working with you in 2015, too, and to seeing many of you in Corning for this year's annual conference. Last year's meeting in Saratoga will be hard to beat, but I'm guessing we might just do it. I'm also expecting another precedent-setting Conference on New York State History this year at Niagara University (Niagara County Historian Catherine Emerson will do a great job on the program committee, I'm sure), and I'm very excited about another great History Month in November. There will be other new milestones, as well, beginning with the good work of the new Social Media and Outreach Committee—Ray LaFever, Clifton Patrick, and Christine Ridarsky—and the development of new social media programs.

So . . . thank you one more time for all of the exceptional work you do for the state and for your communities and for making history by doing it.
